

3 Country Clubs Open Courses to Public This Week

Bill Catto, pro-manager of Sylvan Glen golf club on Rochester road, has announced the club's opening. The diningroom and all clubhouse facilities are open now and by this week end the golf course will be ready for play.

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Gilbertson are in charge of the dining room and cocktail lounge and both are experienced in the business. While Mr. Gilbertson served in the navy, Mrs. Gilbertson managed the Oceanview Hotel and Dining Room in Key West, Fla. The interior of the club has been completely redecorated and the bar has been moved to smaller quarters, leaving the former cocktail lounge available for private din-

ing room facilities for groups up to 80.

A new ladies locker room and punch lounge is now under construction and will be ready by May 1, Catto said.

Golf Course Improved
Improvements on the golf course include new bridges and drainage all over the course and on the sixth fairway, where the double ravine has proved to be too much of a hazard; the farthest one has been tilled and closed up. A new fairway has been provided all around the artificial lake on number 14.

Charlie Ross, owner and manager of Edgewood Country Club on Commerce Road, west of Pontiac, announced that the club and golf course would open on Saturday of this week, March 27. The course has dried out in good shape and it has been possible to condition the greens and fairways, Ross stated.

Heavy play at the course last season has caused the enlargement

of the club house facilities and pro shop at Edgewood. The pro shop will be double in size, offering much more convenience to players as well as shop employees. Much conditioning took place on the course last fall and again this spring and as a result the course will be in fine condition earlier than usual. Among other improvements, rest and rain huts have been constructed.

Announcement has been made by Hugh Ross, manager of Sunnysbrook Golf Club, that the course is ready for play and will be open for the season by this weekend. He also announced that Max Evans, long-hitting young pro who has just returned from playing the winter circuit, will be in charge of the golf shop again this year.

The club house facilities are in full operation and the building has been completely redecorated. Sunnysbrook is located on 17 Mile Road, between Mound and Van Dyke.

Girl Scouts Observe 36th Anniversary With Large Rally and Fashion Show Held at Community House Last Friday

Climax of Birmingham's observance of the 36th birthday anniversary of Girl Scouts in the United States came Friday night, March 19, when over 400 Scouts and Brownies of the city's thirty troops gathered at Barnum School for their annual Rally. Parents and friends occupied every available seat in the spectator's section and an overflow crowd was accommodated in the section reserved for Scouts.

An impressive Color Guard ceremonial was led by Troop 34 of Bloomfield Hills School, the audience joining in the pledge to the flag and the singing of the national anthem, which was followed by the recitation of the Brownie and Girl Scout promises.

Orchestra Makes Debut
As an added attraction to this year's Rally, the all-Girl Scout orchestra, composed of Brookside School Scouts, made its first appearance. After weeks of rehearsal under Celia Merrill Turner, this new group performed creditably in solo work and also accompanied the community sing which was led by Barbara Spangenberg.

Accompanied to the stage by an honor guard of First Class Girl Scouts, Mrs. R. W. Reddy, president of Birmingham's Girl Scout Council, brought greetings and commended these First Class Scouts for their high achievements.

1947 Record Beaten
Mrs. E. J. Barney, Juliette Low Fund chairman, explained the far reaching benefit of the contributions brought by each troop to this annual Rally in tribute to the memory of Girl Scouts' founder, Juliette Gordon Low. A procession of two Brownies and Scouts from each troop in the city then filled Mrs. Barney's basket with their contributions to beat the 1947 total.

When the last penny was counted, Mrs. Barney states, the total sum of the Juliette Low Fund for 1948 is \$160.80. The work of her excellent committee (composed of Mrs. Fraser Pomeroy, Mrs. Gordon Davis and Mrs. Carl Essery) Mrs. Barney states is in a large degree responsible for this year's large total of contributions.

With the business end of the Rally accomplished, Scouts then turned their attention to the show: "Sebuting Through Fashions," written for the occasion by Shirley and Louise Hersey. The cur-

tains parted to show the interior of a clothing store, displaying Scout and Brownie uniforms, and made up by colorful banners displaying the name of each school participating, the work of Troop No. 9 at Adams School.

Set to Music
Troop Leader Mrs. Paul MacDonald accompanied by five Scouts and Brownies entered this shop intent on shopping for fashions for Scouts from dawn to dusk. Music played by Mrs. Donald Stanton set the tempo to which the models walked down the long aisle which ran the length of the auditorium, so everyone caught a good view of suitable clothes for Scouts to wear the clock around.
