**Edison Co. Awards  
Alex Dow Medals**

Five Alex Dow Medals were presented, one posthumously, to Detroit Edison Company employees last week by James W. Parker, president.

One of 1947's winners was the late J. Herbert Walker of Birmingham. Mr. Walker was a vice-president of the company at the time of his death on December 1, 1947. He had served the utility for 36 years.

The award was in recognition of Mr. Walker's outstanding contribution to the field of Human Relations as typified by "The Question Box," a monthly feature of the Company's magazine Synchroscope which he originated and developed to answer employees questions.

Two Dow Medals went to underground lines department men who saved the lives of fellow workers. Marvin Horn, 9500 E. 15 mile road, Warren, and Albert Alken, 4646 Canton avenue, Detroit.

An award went to Thomas Daly, 12138 Cherrylawn, Detroit, of the Company's substation Department. Daly worked for nearly 20 years to develop a process for printing porcelain enamel signs on a special offset press.

The final Alex Dow Medal was tendered to John R. Hamann of Detroit, a technical engineer at the Conners Creek Power Plant, who was cited for the work he did in developing and editing a Company publication entitled "Coal to Kilowatts."

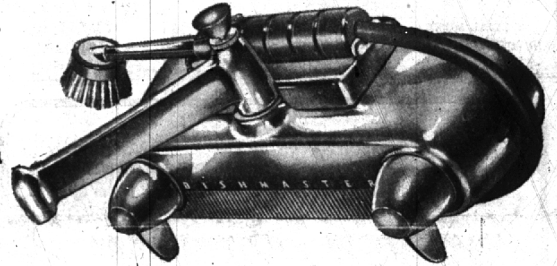
