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State Dept. Trade Expert to Speak Tomorrow at Cranbrook, Baldwin High

Norman Burns, adviser to the Division of Commercial Policy for the U. S. State Department, will stop briefly in the area to speak at Cranbrook School and Baldwin high school, Friday morning, May 14. He will be here on a tour of ten Michigan communities which are observing "World Trade Week for Michigan" with special activities. On the same day he will address a luncheon meeting in Pontiac sponsored by the Exchange Club, Zonta, and Pontiac Chamber of Commerce. At 8:30 a.m. he will address a public meeting at the Royal Oak Public Library. His subject will be "The Reciprocal Trade Agreement and Michigan's Stake". Burns, 42, was one of the trade experts who bargained for the United States at the recent tariff conference in Geneva, Switzerland, and helped to negotiate the most far-reaching agreements ever forged by the United States government. Two years of intensive preparation, both here and abroad, including six months of continuous international negotiations, went into the formulation of the new agreements. With Raw Materials They not only cover the trade relations responsible for over two-thirds of the present trade of the world, but a majority of the arrangements have specifically to do with the raw materials that go into Michigan's automotive and other large industries, as well as providing outlets abroad for Michigan's grains, canned fruits and vegetables, and meat products.

Greyhound to Put 2-Way Radios in Inter-City Buses

Operation of two-way radio communication on Greyhound inter-city operating between Detroit, Flint and Bay City will soon be introduced by the Great Lakes Greyhound Lines. According to E. W. Budd, 856 Lake Park drive, president of the company, Greyhound has been granted temporary authority by the Federal Communications Commission to establish land stations at Flint and Bay City. This is in connection with a special radio frequency assigned to the inter-city motor bus industry now located in Detroit.

BRIDGE AT THE COMMUNITY HOUSE

By James C. Gray (A report on the duplicate bridge tournament held every Wednesday evening at the Community House is cordially invited to participating players.) One way to win a prize in a bridge tournament is to a member of an alliterative team. Consider the results of the east and west match of the May 5 game: First, Rummel and Rothfus; second, Fletcher and Fenwick. "Convincer" Jerry Myers, Gull, Mary, and Jim in union. Very well—corn.

The auction (with neither side vulnerable): South one club; West, one spade; North, two clubs; East, two hearts; South, three diamonds; West, four hearts; South, five clubs (a sacrifice); East, double.

Both the north and south hands were now void in hearts. But each hand contained a lost spade and a loser in diamonds. The loss of two more tricks would vitiate the sacrifice. West, four hearts with the queen of spades—if he held only two diamonds—H—17.

South drew trumps. Then he laid down the ace and king of diamonds. Then, with a silent ruff, he led the spade Jack. Click! West took the trick with his queen and was forced to lead spades on a heart. Either lead enabled South to discard a diamond in dummy and ruff in the closed hand.
