And each of these commissioners is not a professional politician, it must be remembered. His first concern is earning a livelihood for himself and his family. Yet special meetings, personal surveys, etc., take him away from his business continually.

(Continued from Page One) the fact that they believe they are entitled to the securities from their parents until they are 18 years old. One student said he thought this matter should be brought up to the parents, who should provide them until they felt the child was mature enough to provide himself. He based his statement on the fact that some children are more developed than others at earlier ages.

Miss Estelle Martin, director of Family Services in Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Pontiac, led the discussion on smoking and drinking. The main reasons brought out for smoking were that it lends an air of sophistication and helps a person feel at ease. In a survey of the smoking problem, all who spoke declared that they could stop if they so desired.

Summed up, their date reactions show the younger people want something to do that is different from the usual diamond means. They seek a co-educational recreational program as it gives them a chance to meet and broaden their horizons. They favor clubs for boys and girls, with joint participation at regular intervals preferably on week ends when hours are not so rigid because of classes the following day.
