**ORDINANCE NO. 363**  
**CITY OF BIRMINGHAM**  
**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE NUMBER 233 OF THE CITY OF BIRMINGHAM.**

An Ordinance to Amend Ordinance No. 233 of the City of Birmingham, by Amending Section 7 thereof.

The City of Birmingham Ordains: That Section 7 of Ordinance No. 233 of the City of Birmingham be and the same be hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 7. The rates for services furnished by the Water Supply System shall be as follows:

Except hereinafter otherwise provided, water to be furnished by said Water Supply System to each lot shall be measured by a meter installed and controlled by the City. Meters which change are now in effect by virtue of Ordinance No. 233, shall be read quarterly (three months) period, but not less than the following amounts:

Per Quarter	Per Year
For tap equipped with a 1/2 inch meter	\$2.50
For tap equipped with a 3/4 inch meter	4.50
For tap equipped with a 1 inch meter	6.50
For tap equipped with a 1 1/2 inch meter	8.50
For tap equipped with a 2 inch meter	10.50

The minimum quarterly rates above listed cover the first 6,000 gallons of water used in excess of 6,000 gallons. Beyond, however, that in the excess said rates shall be increased by amounting to the City. Water charges not necessary to amend this section, but charges for water consumption, shall be charged in accordance with a connection charge as set forth in the following table:

Where water and six-inch sewer service in one trench are required a connection charge in accordance with the following schedule shall be made:

The charges for sewer and water services as specified herein shall apply from March 15th to November 30th inclusive of each year and during that period December 1st to March 15th inclusive of each year there shall be no charge in the amount of \$10.00 a service in a street and \$10.00 for a service in an alley or easement.

The charges listed above shall provide, where feasible, a sewer with a depth of 7 feet below the grade at the property line. Where the applicant desires a greater depth and if all shall be made to compensate the City for the additional cost of providing such additional depth.

The term "tap" as used herein shall mean any opening or outlet heretofore or hereafter made in said Water Supply System for the purpose of withdrawing water therefrom for any use, public or private, either commercial or domestic, excepting fire hydrants, and no taps shall be made to said system unless authorized by the proper City authorities.

The free service shall be furnished by said Water Supply System to any person, firm or corporation, public or private. The City shall pay for all water used by fire hydrants, but the City shall not be liable for water used through fire hydrants, a flat charge of \$2.00 annually shall be paid by the City out of its appropriate general fund, for each hydrant now or hereafter installed.

Rates for special supply or for temporary supply for any purpose shall be as fixed by the Superintendent of the Water Department and approved by the City Manager.

Charges for water supplied shall constitute a lien on the property served, and if not paid within six months of the next tax roll, and shall be collected in the same manner as provided for the collection of taxes assessed upon such roll and the enforcement of the lien thereon.

The City shall have the right to shut off and discontinue the supply of water rates.

A cash deposit of \$10.00 as security for payment of water rates and charges shall be made by each user in such amount as the Superintendent, in such cases where a deposit is required by the Acts of Michigan, 1933, as amended, July 1, 1948 following the passage and publication hereof.

**More Care at Intersections Urged to Cut Down Annual Traffic Fatalities**

(This is the fourth of a series of 10 articles on street and highway safety, written by nationally recognized accident prevention specialists and published by this newspaper in the interests of greater traffic safety.)

One of the danger zones where a large number of accidents constantly occur is at highway intersections. Often unnoticed, or unheeded, the intersection of highways is the daily scene of death and destruction by motor vehicle collision.

Safety while traveling through or turning at an intersection depends upon the alertness and skill of the driver and the observance of a few simple rules.

At highway intersections, the vehicle on the right usually has the right of way if both reach the intersection at the same time and are driving at a lawful rate of speed, but a safe driver never depends the right of way if an accident appears imminent.

Safety specialists recommend the following precautions at intersections:

1. For Safety
1. Always sacrifice the right of way for safety.
2. When entering or crossing a main highway, give the right of way to all vehicles on that high-

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- Analyze engine compression
- Analyze engine vacuum
- Inspect ignition wiring
- Check coil
- Check starter switch
- Check voltage regulator
- Check generator output
- Check condenser and points

- Adjust tappets
- Tighten cylinder head and manifold
- Remove, clean and adjust carburetor
- Remove and clean fuel pump
