Three Birmingham women were elected to office by the Michigan League of Women Voters at its convention in Lansing on May 19 and 20. Mrs. William Williams was elected second vice-president, Mrs. Howard Liverance, secretary, and Mrs. Philip Pretz, director. Mrs. S. James Dancer of Birmingham attended the convention as a delegate.

Other officers elected were Mrs. Rensil Likert of Ann Arbor, president; Mrs. Donald McGuire of Detroit, first vice-president; Mrs. Lawrence E. Maugh of Ann Arbor, Treasurer. Other directors elected were Mrs. Sidney Hill, Royal Oak; Mrs. A. A. Meeth, Grand Rapids; Mrs. Chalmers D. Thomas, Saginaw; and Mrs. Thomas J. Gwyn of Flint.

The program for the next two years, voted on by the convention, includes revision of the state constitution, an educational program to acquaint citizens of Michigan with fiscal problems, and a study of governmental services for children.

Assists With Petitions
