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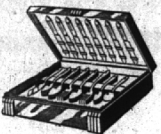

10 More Trees Are Scheduled for Removal

At a public hearing held in the commission room Monday, evening, city commissioners approved the removal of 10 trees on city property, trees which are either public hazards or detrimental to the growth of more perfect specimens nearby.

Recommended for removal by the city forestry department, the trees are: A 29-inch basswood on the southeast corner of Poppleton and Wibleton. Three large soft maples on Maple west of Bates. A 12-inch soft maple on the south side of Lincoln between Edgewood and Caden. Small soft maple on south side of Lincoln, third tree east of Pierce. On the corner of Maple and Adams, a 20-inch elm right by an Edison pole. Eighteen-inch horsechestnut in the road, southeast corner of Brown and Henrietta. A 30-inch elm on the northeast corner of Henrietta and Lincoln. A 2-inch elm on the south side of E. Maple between Columbia and Eton.

New Water Mains Are Proposed for Maryland, B'ham, Shipman Blvds.

To permit further development of property in the Birmingham Crestview subdivision, the city commission Monday night set November 29 as the date for a hearing on installation of water mains on Maryland blvd., and portions of Birmingham and Shipman blvds.

Before setting the hearing, however, the commission rescinded several resolutions on past hearings on individual water main assessment districts now on those streets. They decided since it was a neighborhood matter, that the project should be put into one district.

Under City Manager Donald C. Egbert's recommendation, the project would see: Uniform Pressure Construction of a 6-inch main on Maryland, and 6-inch mains in the north block of Birmingham blvd., and one in the center block of Shipman blvd. The other four blocks in this area are presently served by 4-inch mains in easements at the rear of the lots.

Cost of the entire project is estimated at just under \$40,000. Both the city water department and private property owners will share in the cost of the construction if approved.

Week of Prayer to Start Sunday; 'Y' Distributes Booklets

The Christian Emphasis Committee of the Birmingham YMCA is distributing Week of Prayer booklets entitled "That They All May Be One".

For over a century these two closely related movements have endeavored to serve the youth of the world in the name of Christ. Today more than 10,000 associations are at work in 70 nations. The annual Week of Prayer has been observed during the past 70 years, while days of prayer were arranged by some National Alliances as early as 1865. It was not, however, until 1904 that the call to a Week of Prayer and World Fellowship was issued jointly by the YMCA and the YWCA. The booklet covers daily readings for Nov. 14 through Nov. 20, developing the theme "The Church—On Earth and in Heaven". Copies may be obtained from the 'Y' offices without charge. Work of the 'Y' is a part of the Red Feather Service of the Detroit Community Fund in the Birmingham area.

Newell, City Agree on Terms of Sale

Frank C. Newell, 1108 W. Maple, has accepted a city offer of \$4,000 for several lots on the north side of W. Maple, just west of the Rouge bridge. City Manager Donald C. Egbert told city commissioners Monday evening. The commission authorized the manager to close the deal at this price. The property was acquired by the city to provide future right-of-way for a new bridge approach, as well as complete the city's park system in that area.

Adams School Votes to Adopt a Navajo School in Arizona

The Adams Student Council has completed its organization for the current semester with 32 members. They took the oath of office at an all-school assembly last week. After a lively campaign Jerry White was elected president with Christine Hubert, vice president; Janet White, secretary and Tom Bell, treasurer. Faculty sponsors of the Council at Adams are Geraldine Rutz and Paul Carter, School principal.

Major project for the year is the adoption of the Denchotog School at Kayenta, Ariz. Situated in the most isolated and unproductive part of the great reservation, the school houses 150 Navajo children. C. H. Shaffer, principal, and a staff of five teachers are working amid almost unbelievable conditions of poverty, disease and ignorance. The children at Adams became interested through an article by Fred Dockstader, which was published in the Eccentric last winter. Contact with this school was made with his help.

A clothing drive is now under way for any clean, wearable garments or usable bedding. Contributions may be left at Adams school, or will be picked up by older students, if donors will call the office. While material aid to these unfortunate children is important, it is only one part of the project. Teachers in both schools are using it to smitten language and social studies classes.
