First Hearing on Next Summer's Roadoiling

First part of the city's 1949 roadoiling program was sent on its way Monday night when city commissioners approved the necessity of an assessment district to pay for the costs of the program.

Monday night's action was limited to those streets which already have curb and gutter. Depending on the particular street, the widths to be oiled will vary from 21 to 36 1/2 feet. Most of the streets included in this phase of the program are holdovers from petitions presented to the city last spring. Either because they came in too late or because the city did not have enough oil supply, they were held and inserted in next summer's program.

10 Miles of Roadoiling

There are more than one and one-half million miles of it in transmission lines. Chemical companies are using it in huge quantities and transportation firms are increasing their demands daily. Today's buses are using it as their main body material, in addition to the amounts used as motor parts.
