Schools Topic of Local League at Second Session

"Education lays the foundation for good citizenship" was one of the opening remarks by Mrs. T. Hollister Mabley, education chairman of the Birmingham League of Women Voters, at the group's monthly meeting Monday afternoon in the Community Home. Problems of education at national, state and local levels were presented and discussed by the League's Education committee. Mrs. Mabley pointed out that the teacher shortage was due to several factors: low salaries, poor working conditions in many localities, increased number of children in the schools and fewer teachers being trained. For these and other reasons 350,000 out of 850,000 teachers have left the teaching profession.

Mrs. Mabley also called attention to the problem in school construction. Maintenance and replacement did not go on as it should during the war, and now it has accumulated to such an extent that, at present day costs, there is no money for new buildings. Discuss Schools Mrs. R. B. K'burg explained the effects of amendments two and

five in education. Approval of amendment five regarding bonding issues by voters, means that Birmingham will get its long awaited new high school much sooner. Mrs. Covert Robertson discussed public school financing and Mrs. Eric Hyde covered school expenditures. Mrs. William Jackson talked on the curriculum of Birmingham schools and the improvement over the past few years. Mrs. W. B. Davies presented reasons for and against supporting federal aid to education and predicted there would probably be a new bill for federal aid to education presented to congress as well as an additional one for federal aid to construction of new school buildings.

Mrs. Cleveland Walcutt reported on the Conference for Youth and Children held at Lansing recently. Five Birminghamites, including Mrs. Walcutt, attended the Nov. 12 session. The meeting was presided over by Mrs. F. C. Garrison, president of the Birmingham League.

Government Is Discussed by Women Voters

Governmental structure in city, county, state and the federal level was presented to members of the League of Women Voters at their morning session Monday, Nov. 15. Mrs. William Selmeier in presenting the city government, held of a new booklet containing the basic facts of Birmingham now available at the Municipal Building. Mrs. Cleveland Walcutt, Mrs. Wilbur Johnstone and Mrs. William Essary presented a skit on the county government, giving a clear picture of the muddled condition of county government and the need for reorganization. Mrs. W. W. Williams reviewed the constitutional revision amendment which was lost in the last election and stated the governor-elect will work primarily toward reappointment rather than constitutional convention. Show Influence Mrs. Paul Robertson and Mrs. Covert Robertson gave a picture of the house and senate, showing democratic, liberal and pro-labor influence. Legislative trends such as repeal or amendment of the Taft-Hartley bill; increase of reciprocal trade agreements for three years; new social security laws which will cover more people and increase benefits; continuation of farm supports and prices; continuation of rural electrification and of rent controls; something in the line of Federal education and housing and standby powers for inflation as well as the possibility of oleo getting a break were presented.

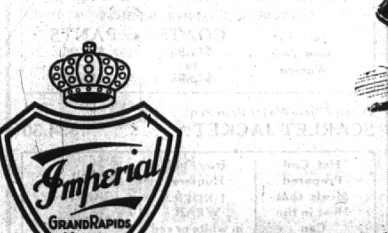
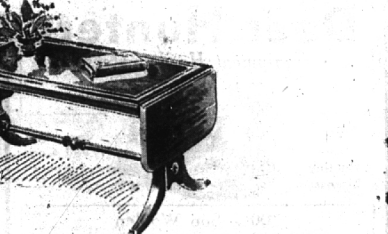
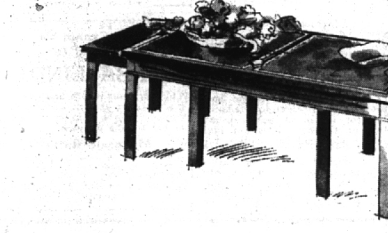
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GIRL SCOUTS

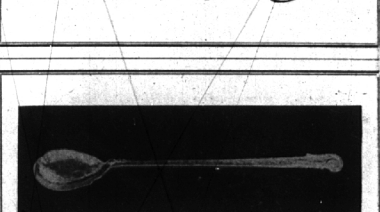
