"These 'stuffed shirts' are people who want to get on, which means they always want to be on the safe side, be agreeable to everyone, know everyone, say and do the right things for fear of offending others," Moseman stated.

This timidity becomes a habit with the "stuffed shirts", and destroys the individualism for which this nation was once famous, the speaker emphasized.

"He hides matters which should be brought to light and thinks this is good business; he does very little thinking about anything else than his own welfare; he confuses his welfare with that of the country; he confuses ends with means. He makes money the end of life, rather than making money the means to a better life."

"The stuffed shirt is here and there. Each man must search his own conscience. I admit I was a stuffed shirt once, and I constantly fear that I still am one," Moseman concluded.

nasium; secondly, the recreational and athletic center.

Construction of new a high school will have an immediate beneficial effect on the entire school system, Ireland said.

Get New Grade School

"We will not be just getting a new high school—it will be the same as adding new wings and new schools around the city," he pointed out.

The present Baldwin high school would be converted into an elementary grade school, whose attendance would be made up of youngsters living in the central portion of the town, yet who presently attend Barnum, Quanton or Pierce schools. This move would reduce the size of classes at the latter three schools and possibly provide considerably more room for future enrollment there. The ninth grade at Barnum would be shifted to the new high school, further relieving the junior high school situation.

"We would get relief all along the line—with just the erection of a new, modern high school," Ireland commented.

In the meantime, the survey will be taken to accumulate facts which will be presented to the electors by the various PTA groups next January or February.

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
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Trial Board to Review Charges
