

21 More City Streets Considered for Next Summer's Roadoilng Program

Little or no objection to the second phase of the city's proposed 1949 summer roadoilng program was evidenced at the city commission meeting Monday evening. So commissioners found necessity for placing oil on portions of 21 more city streets.

Last week, in a similar hearing, the commission approved roadoilng for 11 other streets which have curb and gutter. Monday night's hearing concerned those which had none.

Most of these 32 streets are included in next summer's program as the result of residents' petitions earlier this year. But because the petitions either came in too late for consideration last summer or the city did not have enough oil commitments to take care of them, they were inserted in the 1949 schedule.
