Mrs. Brown was born and raised in Michigan and during World War II served with the Intelligence Department of the United States Navy at Miami, Fla. She also served during the latter part of the war with the AAFTC (Army Air Force Technical Command No. 1 at Miami Beach).

During her time of service with the armed forces Mrs. Brown had plenty of time to observe the training of recruits and consequently is a strong advocate of universal military training.

Her editorials and bulletins on Americanism have received national recognition and many are in the Congressional Library in Washington, D. C.

In addition to being a housewife and a business woman, Mrs. Brown finds time to talk and lecture before women's groups on "Selling America to Americans", a most important subject at this time.

Mrs. Brown's message to American women is: "Forget Selfism and Sell Americanism."

The secret of success she holds lies in the women's ability to evaluate properly the most important thing in their lives; then to understand that value. Select a goal which will bring new and more abundant activities. "Creative Creativity" don't be satisfied with the accepted way, she advises. Inquire if a better way is possible and strive to be creative in thought and not cautious.

"The great secret lies in the woman's desire to think not only in terms of herself but for all America and her American heritage. The all important question is 'What kind of an American Am I?'" She emphasizes.

Miss Joyce Pagester Engaged to Marry

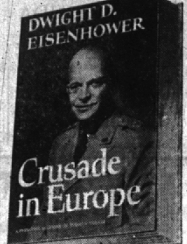
