The facts written in this column are the history of Birmingham Royal Oak games since the start but if you are at Pierce Field tomorrow at 10:30 a.m. you will see history being made. The Maple-Acorn rivalry is known throughout Michigan as one of the oldest and most colorful of fighting traditions. This rivalry began in 1897 in a vacant lot on the corner of Woodward and Ten Mile. Since that game over a half a century ago, the two teams have met almost every year. School authorized or regularly scheduled contests began in 1913, and the Thanksgiving game tradition was born in 1915. Of the 35 scheduled games Birmingham emerged victorious in 11, Royal Oak in 18, and seven ended in ties. The Acorns have won 211 points to the Maples' 112.

Hills Victory Over Waterford Ends An Undefeated Season

Last Thursday Bloomfield Hills High School met and defeated Waterford High, 27-6, thereby completing an undefeated season. Bloomfield started scoring early in the first quarter, when they took over on their own 35 yard line. On consecutive running plays, halfback Jack McGreggor and quarterback Dick Blake made the ball to the Waterford two yard line. Fullback Howard Rogers scored the touchdowns on a line back. Again Blake and McGreggor made the ball downfield. McGreggor scored on a nine yard off-tackle smash making the score 13-0. Waterford's captain Larkin intercepted a pass and behind beautiful interference ran for a 45 yard touchdown and their only score. Bloomfield came back to score on a 35 yard pass from Birch to Proctor.

In the second half Bloomfield Hills was content to play more conservatively. Dick Blake sparked the team to another quick score. He went off tackle for 35 yards and was brought down on the one yard line. Rogers scored on a delayed kick. Waterford tried hard to get back in the game. On several occasions they had pass receivers in the clear only to have the man drop the ball.
