KEEPING HOUSE

A Smile Can Go a Long Way—so make the best of yours. . . Keep your teeth looking clean and healthy by brushing them at least twice daily. Once a month take a half teaspoon of salt and a half teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda and mix them together in the palm of your hand.

Moisten the tooth brush and use as you would a regular tooth powder. You'll find that this little ritual will remove dullness and make your teeth look several shades brighter.

Unusually large teeth look smaller if the lips are made up to look fuller. . . Apply lipstick more evenly by using a brush to draw clean sweeping curves, and to fill out narrow lips by brushing lipstick outside of the natural lip line to create fullness.

Don't use pink shades of lipstick to enlarge the mouth as the lip line is visible through these light colors.

If you put your lipstick on after the powder has been applied to your face, it will be less likely to spread into the pores around the mouth. . . Lipstick remains on longer when you remember not to moisten the lips while wearing it.

Whittle your figure down to suit the new fashions. Salads and fruits are non-fattening. Remember that sherbets, sodas and long cold drinks have a high calorie content and will add extra pounds before you realize it. Outdoor activity makes it more simple and pleasant to keep in shape.

Clothes Care: When sending clothes to the cleaner, wear buttons if you are not absolutely certain as to how well they can stand the cleaning process. Plastic buttons often melt in the pressing as they are not strong enough to withstand high temperatures. Metal backed buttons sometimes break and stain the fabric around them.

Other types of buttons may break, chip, or tear away from the garment leaving a hole, if care is not taken in handling. When putting clothes through the washing machine, make certain that the buttoned ends of the garment is turned inward to protect both the garment and the buttons.
