## GIRL SCOUTS

Over 100 Girl Scout Leaders, representing troops in 12 Oakland County communities, also as far distant as Lansing, gathered at Adams school Wednesday, Oct. 6, for an evening of instruction in song and dance by British-born Janet E. Tobitt. "Music speaks in a universal language of human needs and aspirations," said Miss Tobitt, "it is a unifying force in a chaotic world."

Believing that notes and words of a song are not enough but that she is cognizant of the wide scope of Girl Scout work and has conducted leadership courses on all phases of the 11 program of Scouting, but she believes that music can be used to demonstrate practically every program field. As an example she presented, in connection with home makers work, the United States negro camp meeting song, "Oh, Won't You Sit Down." The Bohemian folk song and "To The Garden Annie Went" with its second line running "cutting cabbage her intent" could most easily illustrate the three program fields of agriculture, nature, or out-of-doors.

"Our Puritan forebears believing even the fiddle to be an instrument of the devil, provided their own music for games," explained Miss Tobitt, and put her audience through breathless paces of "I Want To Be A Farmer", a play-party game which is a good mixer for a crowd and eliminates the necessity of an orchestra as the dancers provide their own music (providing they are long-winded, says your puffing reporter who participated).

All of the songs taught by Miss Tobitt are to be found in her compilation "The Ditty Bag," and the dances are described in "From-nade All," both books having been ordered by the Girl Scout office in the Baldwin Library and will be available for purchase by leaders.

Clothes For Friendship On The Air

If any of your friends should call you, as a Girl Scout or Girl Scout leader, and say they heard Clothes For Friendship mentioned on the radio, they'll probably be referring to a plan of cooperation that has just been worked out by the Girl Scout national office and the network program "When A Girl Marries" (NRM), Monday through Friday, 5:00-5:15 p.m., Eastern Daylight Time).

So this program will carry a minimum of two announcements a week, asking listeners to contribute layettes, which will be turned over to the Girl Scouts Clothes For Friendship project. The response to such an appeal over a national hook-up should bring a sizable addition to our national clothing kit quota of 100,000 kits by the end of the year.
