

Afternoon Duplicate Bridge Group Added to Community House Classes

Enrollment in Community House classes, reported to the Community House board at its monthly meeting Monday.

Social dancing classes started Tuesday night, or one week later than planned, and registration for the twelve week series of Arthur Murray instructed dance lessons, are still being accepted.

Mrs. Isley also announced the formation of an afternoon duplicate bridge group which the Community House has been asked to sponsor. All players who wish to

participate regularly in duplicate bridge are asked to contact the recreation director, Mary Ingalls. Those interested in social dancing instruction are urged to sign up this week, their last opportunity for the current series.

1,246 Groups Use Houses

The most heavily attended classes in the leisure time series are silver work, with an enrollment of 33 in three sections; ceramics and clothing, each with two sections in which 22 are enrolled. Twenty-four are taking instruction in bridge, 12 in hooked rug making, 10 in painting and nine are studying beginning French.

Mrs. Isley reported that 1,246 groups used the Community House during September and attendance at events totaled more than 9,300.

In the Ranch Room, which started the season with an open house on September 17, attendance is setting new records. Both teenagers and Club 1939 report booms in attendance. The club 1939, which uses the Ranch Room regularly, now has a paid membership of 60, the recreation director reported.

The Ranch Room has a full program of weekend amusement

planned and is anticipating crowded tables and a busy snack bar and juke box during the football season. Miss Ingalls reported that hayride for which accommodations for 40 who signed up were provided had to be expanded at the last minute to provide for 98. The hayride was followed by a picnic at the country club.

Arthur S. McCall, treasurer of the Community House board of directors, reported the completion of an audit of Community House Association books showing total assets of \$28,759.32.

Postoffice Has Installed New Package Service

Acting Postmaster Bernard Fowler announces the installation of the new "metered" parcel post service at the Birmingham office. The meter was installed Tuesday, ready for immediate use.

Over 100 more cities are ready to install these meters, Fowler said. "The new service cuts down on clerical time and saves the mailer a long wait in line," the acting postmaster explained. "Packages are taken to the mailing window for weighing, and at a touch of a lever by the clerk, the correct postage comes from the machine in the form of a pre-stamped, pre-marked, pre-cancelled and pre-moistened label. There is no more time spent by the clerk to get the proper stamps."

Fowler, in discussing the machine, said it would be of great help during the Christmas rush. It will cut one man's time about 50 per cent. This will help us to cut down on the jam of work a great deal. We are planning now to work the Christmas season more satisfactorily than in the past, and the meter is going to help us. In addition to cutting down the human time element, the meter will allow the dispatching of packages earlier. They will require just the one handling, rather than several, and will be in earlier trains. Fowler is also planning to open an additional stamp window during the Christmas rush.

Oil Industry to Spend Billions to Increase Supply

First of several talks to be given by Ethyl Corporation Research Laboratories personnel in connection with the Oil Progress Week observance was made last week before the Royal Oak Rotary Club by Charles P. Kass, president of the Ethyl Corporation. Oil Progress Week is today, Oct. 14.

In his talk to the Royal Oak Rotary, Kass disclosed that the American oil industry plans to spend three billion dollars in the next year for replacement and expansion of facilities in an effort to keep up with the unprecedented growth of demand for petroleum products.

He explained that lack of steel and other critical materials had delayed completion of part of the industry's expansion program, which called for the replacement of four billion dollars in the two-year period of 1947 and 1948.

Overall demand for the petroleum products in 1947 was 35 per cent above 1941 and even greater than the peak wartime year of 1946, he said. It is expected that the 1948 demand will be at least 6 per cent greater than 1947.

Kass said proven reserves of crude oil reached an all-time high of nearly 35 billion barrels at the end of 1947 despite the record consumption.

Voluntary cooperation of the public in conserving in their use of petroleum products during the past winter to help the industry stretch record supplies to meet the abnormal demand was praised by Kass.

"It had not been for the public's splendid cooperation," he said, "widespread distress and hardship might have resulted because of the tight race between supply and demand."

Silverworkers to See British Expert Work in New Color Film

Feeling that others doing silverwork as a hobby would be interested in watching the work of the expert craftsman, R. A. Brewer of Macnamus, John and Adams, has secured an art education film, "Handwrought Silver." Through contact with Dr. Robert T. Hatt, director of Cranbrook Institute of Science, the use of the Cranbrook auditorium was secured.

The film will be shown there Tuesday evening, Nov. 9. Due to the limited seating capacity, Brewer has asked that those interested in seeing this film contact him.

The film, 16mm in color, shows the work of William E. Bennett, of England's foremost craftsmen and teachers, at work. A teacher at Sheffield College of Arts and Crafts, Bennett shows each step of raising a bowl from a flat sheet of sterling silver. From the preliminary selection of metal and tools, to the soldering on of the base and the final polishing, the film portrays accurately every action of this great silversmith.

So complete is its detail, that it appears to the observer, as though he, himself were doing the work. Close-ups show the action of the silver under the hammer, the actual flow of the solder and the color changes of metal under heat, which are the temperature guides of the craftsman.
