### BIRMINGHAM VETERAN NEWS

Prior notice from the Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus (O) will be sent to veterans in Michigan whose National Service Life Insurance term policies expire after October 8, 1948. VA officials said notice will be sent two months before the expiration date of the original policies. This will give the veterans time to convert their term insurance to a permanent NSLI plan or renew their term insurance for an additional five-year period. Renewals may be made without a physical examination, but at a higher premium rate based on the veterans' attained age at the time of renewal.

VA stressed the fact that veterans who plan to renew their term insurance should submit their renewal application, the premium payment at the advanced rate, prior to the expiration date of the original term policy.

Veterans enrolling in college and universities this fall may not receive their first subsistence checks until the week of November 7. Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus announces.

First checks will include all subsistence payments due from the date of enrollment through the end of October. In most areas the first payments cannot be made before that date because of the heavy workload the colleges and VA face in processing extremely large enrollments.

Veterans are urged to make arrangements to meet their financial obligations until their first checks are sent out.

Young dentists who desire to take internship in the Navy may now do so under a new program just instituted, it was announced by Lt. Comdr. A. J. Schultz, Jr., of the Office in Charge of the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 940 Book Building, Detroit.

The dental intern training program is a form of professional education, beyond the undergraduate level, designed to offer special opportunities for clinical experience and advanced training in dental science and practice.

Fundamental purpose of the program is to broaden the knowledge of the Naval dental officer who is a recent dental graduate by affording him opportunities for viewing and treating oral conditions through their clinical progress, and to supplement his knowledge of oral and systemic relationships in health and disease. The training period is for twelve months and young men accepted will be given commissions and Lieutenant (Junior grade) in the regular Navy.

### Local Man 20 Years With Shell Oil Co.

Tomorrow will mark the 20th anniversary of C. S. Maxwell, rural route 7, with the Shell Oil Company.

He began with the company at Dearborn, Ill., as salesman and within a few months was named assistant credit manager. In 1931 he went to Chicago as credit clerk and worked in that capacity until 1935, when he was named credit manager.

Two years later he was transferred to Kansas City as credit manager, going from there to St. Louis where he served as wholesale credit manager. In 1940 he was returned to Chicago as assistant division credit manager.

He came to Detroit in this capacity in 1942 and in 1945 was made chief accountant for the entire Michigan area. In 1946 he was promoted to his present position as office manager.

Gerald A. Speedy, assistant national director of Cubbing for the Boy Scouts of America, will be guest speaker during the Local Council's Annual Pow-Wow at the Charles Howell Boy Scout Reservation, near Brighton, this weekend, Saturday and Sunday, October 16-17. Speedy is a 25 year veteran Scouter and has been actively associated with Cubbing since 1928.

Following his completion of the 43rd National Training School for Scout Executives, he became Cubbing Director of the Minneapolis Area Council, serving until his promotion to the national staff in 1940. He is a graduate of the University of Minnesota, where he majored in social work, and is author of several textbooks on younger boys' programs.

Five different courses will be offered at the Pow-Wow, each course requiring at least seven and three-quarters hours of credit. The subjects offered are pack administration, games and play ways, Cub Scouting handcrafts, ceremonies and entertainment, and Cub Scout advancement. The nine different geographical districts, which make up the local council territory, have been assigned quotas, as overnight accommodations at the reservation are limited to three hundred persons.

Dress for the Pow-Wow is informal. Den mothers and Pack leaders may bring uniforms for the Sunday morning religious services. All Cubbers must bring their own bedding, toilet articles, flashlight, pen or pencil and three-ring notebook. Those taking the craft course, should bring a knife, coping saw, file, tin snips, scissors, hammer and assorted nails.

Early arrivals at the Pow-Wow will be given materials and taught to make some useful article of handicraft which they will keep as a souvenir. A beautiful certificate will be presented to each participant who attends all sessions of the course in which he or she enrolls. Pack leaders are urged to bring their American and Pack flags, Den doodles, and other colorful display materials. A midway of interesting outcure games is another of the many attractions being presented.

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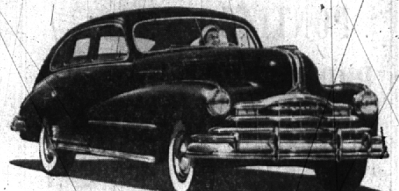
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
