was originally known as the Business Girls' Club. For several years its meetings were held at 4001 in the original Community House at Bates and West Maple roads.

Two other women in the club history were Mrs. W. D. Thompson, the first woman banker in the state of Michigan, and Mary Clark Griffith, second hostess of the Community House. It is in Miss Griffith's honor that the Mary Griffith Loan Fund was founded to assist girls in furthering their business education. This is still an active part of the club.

Change Name

It was during Mrs. Bertha Davidson's term as president of the group during the depression years that the club became known as the Birmingham Business Women's Club.

The organization has the distinction of being the first service club to be formed in Birmingham. During the past 25 years its members have engaged in many civic projects including energetic efforts to raise money for the present Community House when it was built. The group's activities have included sending boys and girls to camps, knitting over 35 afghans and purchasing bed lamps, radios and a wheel chair for wounded veterans. Lovers and bed jackets for invalids and yearly contributions to the Red Cross and Cancer fund.

At the regular business meeting of the club in the Community House, on Oct. 7, new officers were elected.

Named president was Jane Wooten; vice-president, Audrey Kemp; secretary, Bea Olson; treasurer, Virginia Brennan; Mary Griffith Loan Fund, Vera Olin.
