## Poll of Students Shows Vagrancies of Average Voter

Because of the great interest in the coming presidential election, the second, third, fifth and sixth high civics classes polled a total of 637 people last week to find the reactions of the voting public. Survey sheets consisting of ten pertinent questions were drawn up and eight of these questionnaires were given to each student. An equal percentage of men and women to be polled was tried for, and approximately 47 per cent were men and 53 per cent women.

Variety of Reasons Results showed that 87 per cent of those polled are registered and 13 percent are not. When asked if they voted in the primary only 44 per cent said they had. A variety of reasons was given by the 354 who failed to vote. Among these were illness, forgot, country can get along without my vote, not important enough to bother, and too busy.

Asked their reaction to the third party eight per cent were favorable, 69 opposed, and 20 indifferent or failed to answer; the other three per cent expressed the opinion that it would split the Democratic party.

Most of those polled were familiar with their candidates and party platforms and 42 per cent voted a straight ticket as compared with 53 per cent who split their vote. It was also found that 65 per cent preferred to vote by machine, 23 liked the ballot, and the remaining ten per cent had no preference.
