The SCORE PAD

(Score and nonsense at the bridge table. Other jottings.)

"Why, partner, that's an absolute top score for us, 'Lookie!'" And Olive McLaren proudly passed the score sheet across the table to May Eech.

May glanced at the slip of paper. "Well, what do you know? Everybody going down except us. And we made an over-trick."

"How in the world did you do it?"

"I guess the defense wasn't so good or something. Let's look at the hands."

NORTH (Olive)
S-Q-9
H-K-7-3
D-Q-10
C-K-6-4-3

WEST (May)
S-A-10-8-3-2
H-Q-2
D-8-7
C-10-5

EAST
S-5-4
H-A-J-10-9-6
D-K-10
C-8-7-2

"I remember how it went, now. West gave me a break right in the beginning by opening his fourth high spade, the eight spot. If he had opened the queen of hearts I would have been set before I got the lead. But of course he couldn't tell that."

"Dummy held that first trick with the nine spot. Then I took the diamond finesse to the jack and played the diamond ace, dropping East's king. That established the diamond suit."

"At that point I decided that my only chance was to find the clubs distributed three-three in the opponents' hands. Because if I tried to set up another spade-trick, West would surely lead hearts and I had a strong feeling that the heart ace was in the East hand. So I played my three top clubs—and the suit did not break. Now, I was sunk."

"My impulse was to cash my last two diamond tricks and take a set of one trick. But something told me to keep those diamonds for entries—just in case. So I led the spade queen up to West's ace."

Partner, one of the curious things about bridge is the weird defensive play against no-trump contracts. The declarer is often worried, as I was in this case. But the defense, many times, is a mat-

ter of the blind leading the blind."

"West was just as concerned about the heart situation as I was. And he was in love with his spade suit. So he led a spade back—up to my king."

"This gave me the contract and a perfect end play for the over-trick. I cashed my good diamonds and threw East in the lead with a club. He cashed his heart ace and had to lead up to my king. I guess this is just my night."
