STATE OF MICHIGAN—ORDER OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

PHASANTS AND OTHER UPLAND GAME

The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation relative to the hunting of pheasants, recommends certain regulations.

THEREFORE, the Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 239, P. A. 1923, hereby orders that for a period of one year beginning October 1, 1948, it shall be unlawful to hunt, take, or kill or attempt to hunt, take, or kill any pheasant or any pheasant in the State of Michigan during the period from October 1 to October 25, inclusive, and to take or kill any wild bird or wild animal before the first day of October, 1948.
