#### Will Speak Before Life Underwriters

Lantz L. Mackey, C.I.U., president of L. L. Mackey and Associates in Detroit, has accepted the invitation of the National Association of Life Underwriters to speak on the subject of modern trends in selling business life insurance at the national convention in St. Louis, September 14-17.

The N.A.L.U. is made up of 515 local Associations totaling 50,699 members from the States, the District of Columbia and Hawaii. Michigan's membership numbers 1660, approximately half of whom belong to the Detroit Association, the rest distributed throughout the state.

Coming to Detroit from Iowa in 1938, Mackey joined the Home Life Insurance Company at that time. He qualified for the Million Dollar Table in 1942, '43 and '46. He is a life and qualifying member of the Life Insurance League of Michigan. He has served as president of the Detroit Life Underwriters Association, the Detroit Chapter of Chartered Life Underwriters and is currently the National Committeeman from Detroit on the N.A.L.U.

He is instrumental in the organization of the Detroit Life Insurance and Trust Council, and has served on the national association's committee on Cooperation with Trust Officers.

Mackey lives at 18577 St. Jose, Southfield Township.

#### STATE OF MICHIGAN—ORDER OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION—KACCOON—LOWER PENINSULA

The Director of Conservation, having made a thorough investigation relative to the trapping of raccoons in the Lower Peninsula, recommends certain regulations.

WHEREFORE, the Commission, in pursuance of authority of Act 220, P. A. 1947, Chapter 10, for a period of two years from October 1, 1947, shall prohibit the trapping of raccoons in the Lower Peninsula north of the north line of Saginaw Bay, excepting from November 15 to the north line of Town 16, North and East County, excepting from December 1 to the date of the order.
