Dr. Elias Arend
A doctor of music who for years was active in the Dutch underground will speak at the First Baptist Church Wednesday, Oct. 6 at 8 p. m. Dr. Elias Den Arend, born in Holland, has been in this country a little over one year. Now he is touring this country recounting his experiences of recent years.
In 1940 he was called into the Dutch army in Leyden. Five days after entering the war, Holland was forced to capitulate. Dr. Den Arend then joined forces with the Dutch underground and served in the selecting and training of saboteurs. Many of these under-cover enemies of the invaders were pastors.
Meanwhile, persecutions broke out all over Holland. Christians there performed a service in finding safe hiding places for the victims, providing them with money and food.
Pursued by the Gestapo, Dr. and Mrs. Den Arend and their son were forced to flee from their native land. They wandered about from place to place for three years. After many experiences, the family arrived safely in New York.
Dr. Den Arend will be introduced by the Rev. Emil Kozic, pastor of the church, who met him last summer. The meeting is open to the public.
It is a rare few who are responsible for nine out of ten forerunners.

Newspapermen to Meet at U. of M.

ANN ARBOR—Newspaper publishers editors and writers are meeting at the University of Michigan Sept. 30-Oct. 2 for the annual sessions of the University Press Club of Michigan.
Among their featured speakers are Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg, chief of staff, U. S. Air Force; Dr. Alexander G. Ruthven, president of the University; George J. Burke, Ann Arbor attorney and a judge at the U. S. Military Tribunal at Nuremberg, Germany; and John P. Dammann, University law professor and foreign trade administrator for the U. S. Department of State.
Heads of several departments of the state government will participate in a discussion of public welfare and health problems in Michigan.
Press Club members will also be guests of the Board in Control of Athletics at the Michigan-Oregon football game on Saturday, Oct. 2. Among those editors attending Friday's meetings and Saturday's game will be George Wm. Averill, managing editor of The Birmingham Eccentric.

To Speak

On Sunday, Oct. 5, the First Baptist Church will observe its annual Homecoming Day. The church has secured as its special speaker Dr. Ralph Taylor Andem, preacher, traveler and lecturer. A representative committee has been making extensive plans to develop a broad and varied program.
Activities begin with the meeting of the church school at 9:45 a. m. Some old timers and former members will attend and speak in some of the adult classes. Parents are invited to accompany their children to the church school hour which has classes for all ages.
At 11 a. m. there will be an un-tilted worship service in the sanctuary. Dr. Andem will preach a sermon on "Christians—The World's Major Hindrance." The choir under the direction of Mrs. Walter E. Turner will render special anthems. The service will include an observance of world wide communion. On this Sunday Protestant churches of all denominations around the globe unite in

a universal celebration of the Lord's Supper.

Sunday Dinner
A feature of the Homecoming Day program will be the serving of Sunday dinner at the church. Right after the morning worship hour, the entire congregation will gather in the banquet hall for a complete dinner together. There will be a reservation fee.
Following the dinner, Dr. Andem will give an illustrated lecture entitled "World Fellowship is Possible." His address and his pictures in natural color are based upon a recent trip to Europe when he attended the sessions of the Baptist World Congress at Copenhagen, Denmark. On that occasion he traveled in several other European countries.
Dr. Ralph Taylor Andem is a graduate of Boston University and Andover-Newton Theological school. He held pastorate in Maine and Rhode Island. For the past 20 years he has been the executive secretary of the Michigan Baptist Convention, an organization of several hundred Baptist churches in the state. Hilldale College has honored him with the degree of Doctor of Divinity.
In announcing plans for Homecoming Day, the Rev. Emil Kozic, pastor of the church, stressed the fact that all present and former members and friends were cordially invited to participate in any and all features of the observance.

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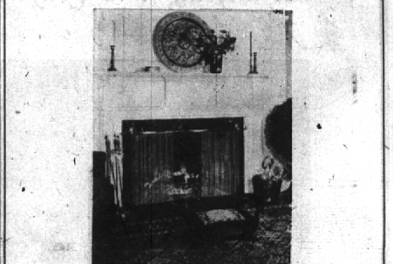
CHURCH CLUB NOTES

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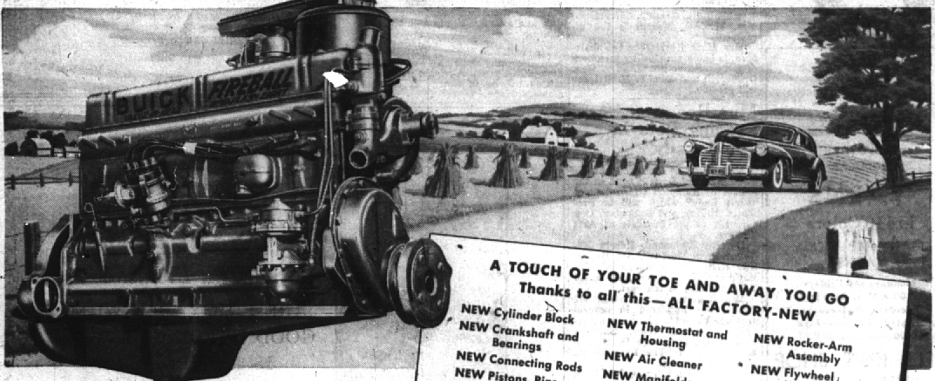
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
