HIGHLAND RECREATION AREA—RULES AND REGULATIONS.
Commissioner, by authority of Act 17, P. A. 1921, as amended, hereby orders that for a period of five years from October 1, 1948, it shall be unlawful to hunt, trap, or fish in the following described area:
The E. of Section 21 lying south 1/2 mile north of Grand Road, Township 28 North, Range 7 East; that part of Sec. 21, 1/2 mile north of M-28, Township 29 North, Range 7 East; that part of Sec. 21, 1/2 mile north of M-28, Township 29 North, Range 7 East; and that part of Sec. 21, 1/2 mile north of M-28, Township 29 North, Range 7 East.

PENALTY.
Violation of the foregoing regulation shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$100 and costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment in the county jail for not more than 30 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

John F. Mills Former Resident Named Director

A former Birmingham resident, John F. Mills, was recently named art director of the Battle Creek Civic Art Center. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Mills who once resided on Maple avenue, of Royal Oak.

Mills attended Baldwin high school, studied at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. He also attended Columbia University where, after passing special entrance examinations, he was a special student. He also attended Wayne University and the University of Montana.

Mills started his art training at an early age by attending the Arts and Crafts school in Detroit. While still a youngster, he won the Michigan Forensic League contest in Highland Park.

While in the east, he edited the NBC house organ and was in charge of a recorded program which was presented over the Columbia University radio station. He served as assistant art editor of the Cranbrook Academy of Art and helped design and build sets for the University Workshop there.

By Christmas, 1947, Mills was back home and soon established a studio at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. He taught in Detroit's Institute of Art and in Birmingham and Royal Oak on various evenings. He assumed his duties in Battle Creek on Sept. 1.

A Birmingham resident, Dr. Ernest Scheyer, a professor at Wayne University, was asked by Mills to speak at the Center's opening last weekend.

BIRMINGHAM CITY COMMISSION RESOLUTION NO. 1188 (1948)
Moved by Commissioner VanDusen, supported by Commissioner Taylor, WHEREAS, the city manager has reported the need for construction of sidewalks on the north side of Linnwood Avenue from Adams to Woodward and across the parkway section on Woodward Avenue;

ADAMS PARK SUBDIVISION
Lot 11 and Lot 12, except that part in Block 38, Adams Park, 1st-1st, Project and across the parkway section on Woodward Avenue, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that it is the intent of the City of Birmingham to make such improvement and that the Clerk of said City be and she is hereby instructed to notify the owners of the above described private property of the intention of the City to make such improvement and to receive the cost thereof against the property benefited in accordance with the provisions of Section 2, Chapter XI and Section 19, 11, 12 and 13 of Chapter 3 of the Charter of the City of Birmingham, Michigan, and Ordinance No. 287 and 298 of the City of Birmingham; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that in the event the owners of said property shall fail to erect sidewalks on said sidewalk within 15 days after the date of such notice, the City Manager shall be and he is hereby authorized to erect such sidewalks on the said sidewalk and to report the cost thereof to the owners of said property, and should the Treasurer be unable to collect said sums, he shall report back to this body a statement setting forth the cost of such construction, for assessment of the same against the said property in conformity with the provisions of the Charter.
