MEAT CUT Quiz



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat?
A. This is a beef club steak.
Q. Where does the cut come from and how is it identified?
A. The club steak comes from the short loin of beef. It is the smallest for an individual serving portion and lies next to the rib roast of beef. It does not have the "tail" and the tenderloin muscle characteristic of the larger porterhouse and T-bone steaks. The eye muscle has a semi-circular or half-moon appearance with the meat all on one side of the bone. The meat is tender and delicious, as in all steaks.
Q. How should this cut be prepared?
A. Like all tender cuts, the club steak is broiled. The meat should be at least one inch thick, and thicker if desired. Shake the fat around the edges so the steak will not "curd" during cooking. Place the steak on a broiler rack so the surface of the meat is about 2 or 3 inches from the heat. Broil until the top of the meat is brown (for medium steaks: 10 minutes for a 1-inch steak, 15 minutes for a 1 1/2-inch steak, 25 minutes for a 2-inch steak.) Season with salt and pepper, turn it over on the other side, allowing about the same length of time. Season and serve at once.
