2 Police Officers Are Selected for Advanced Training

Two Birmingham police officers have been selected to attend special courses in advanced police work, Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley announced today.
Patrolman Merrill L. Holmquist and George McCann are the two officers getting the opportunity as a result of placing highest in a written examination and personal interview. Seven officers took the tests.

Holmquist, who placed first in an examination covering Michigan criminal code and city ordinances, will be enrolled at the FBI National Academy at Washington, D. C. Moxley has written the Academy requesting that Holmquist be included in an early class.

Three Month's Course
A three-month course, the FBI training covers many phases of advanced police work such as fingerprinting and identification, photography, investigation, ballistics, etc.

Officer McCann will attend a three weeks' course at the police traffic school at Northwestern, University, Evanston, Ill., where he will learn about such traffic problems as control, administration, accident investigation, law enforcement, records, engineering and safety education.

few years until the city had a complete road rebuilding job, Kenneway said. Improvement of the road can be done now at about \$2.70 per foot, while costs will rise to possibly \$5.70 per foot or more four or five years from now when the roadbed is badly damaged, he added.

Mohegan residents, according to John D. Maynard, 919 Mohegan, did not agree with Kenneway's residents that the assessment district should not be created.
"We admit we have one of the poorest streets in the city, but most of us want something done about it. If hard surfacing is the answer, then give us that," Maynard pleaded.

Speed Increases Noise
Kenneway residents want the improvement of their street, bringing up the old argument that hard surfaces lead to more and faster speeding.

Both Mallender and Maynard attacked this point as fallacious. "National Safety Council figures show less accidents occur on hard surfaced streets than on gravel or dirt ones," the mayor challenged. Maynard said that his street had plenty of holes but they didn't slow down speeders.

"The only difference the holes make is the loudness of the noise the car makes when it hits the bumps—the deeper the hole, the louder the noise," he declared.

Roll Is Tabled
The commissioners agreed to table the assessment roll until September 27, returning it to the city assessor for a more detailed apportionment of costs on each street involved. If the commission on that date decided to eliminate part of the district, the roll would be ready for confirmation based on the new costs.

In a second hearing on improvement of Bates, from Lincoln south to halfway between Northlawn and Southlawn, the commission tabled indefinitely the assessment roll until detailed construction plans were presented to the commissioners.

A \$4,511.65 sewer assessment district was confirmed for the west end of Humphrey street to relieve that area of improper and inadequate drainage.

A one-man chain saw said to operate with equal efficiency in any cutting position has been developed by an Eastern company as a contribution to low-cost building. The saw is said to be especially useful for construction timber cutting, as well as for light falling and bucking, and for limbing.
