Parking Lot Study Is Aim of New C of C Committee

As a result of replies received in answer to a questionnaire submitted to the membership, the directors of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce this week appointed a committee to study the establishment and financing of municipal parking lots.

Named to the committee were Arthur R. Forster, Henry Hart, and Harris O. Machus.

They will assist the committee which was recently appointed by Mayor Milton F. Mallender to study parking lot financing. A considerable amount of material relative to the parking problem now in C of C files will be turned over to the new committee for its use.

Of the replies received, 93 per cent indicated the person questioned believed Birmingham presently has a parking problem, 86 per cent approved municipal lots, and 80 per cent favored using at least part of parking meter and parking violation revenues to finance the lots.

Traffic Death Toll Climbs to Peak for Year

The traffic death toll of 133 persons in July established a new high for the year, but was one less than the 134 killed during the same month in 1947, according to the monthly statistical report of the Michigan State Police. The previous high was in June, when 119 died.

There were 10,719 accidents and 3,913 persons injured. Accidents increased eight per cent and deaths of a year ago and injuries were down from 42 to 31 on the same comparative basis.

Deaths resulting from collisions with railroad trains increased sharply, with 12 in July of this year as compared to four in July of last year. Pedestrian deaths were down from 42 to 31 on the same comparative basis.

During the first seven months of this year 716 persons were killed and 21,724 injured in 79,662 accidents. Compared with the same period last year, deaths decreased 26, or four per cent; injuries increased 1,786, or nine per cent, and accidents increased 3,918, or five per cent.

Mileage for the first six months of this year was up 10 per cent over the same period of 1947, but the death rate was down 12 per cent.
