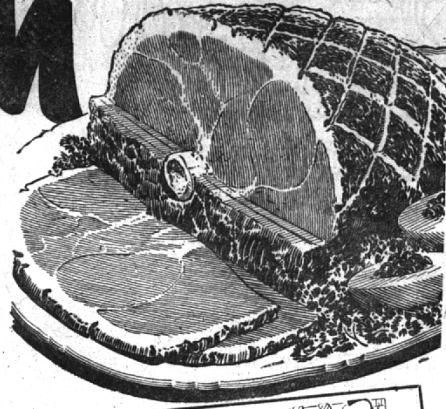

## C of C Opposes Program for Social Medicine

The Birmingham Chamber of Commerce, through its board of directors, this week went on record as vigorously opposing President Truman's proposed program for socialized medicine.

The text of the C of C's resolution reads: "WHEREAS, socialized medicine presently called 'Health Insurance,' recently proposed to Congress by the Administration, has its roots in concepts of regimentation and dictatorship, would impose heavy additional tax burdens on all the people, would undermine the superior standard of health care now available and steadily improving, and is obnoxious to all American principles of free enterprise and individual liberty;

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of the Birmingham Chamber of Commerce that all efforts to impose socialized medicine in any form or under any name on the American people is hereby vigorously opposed, and that a copy of this Resolution be sent to each of Michigan's United States Senators and Representatives to Congress, to every member of Birmingham's Chamber of Commerce and to every Chamber of Commerce or similar Association in the State of Michigan."

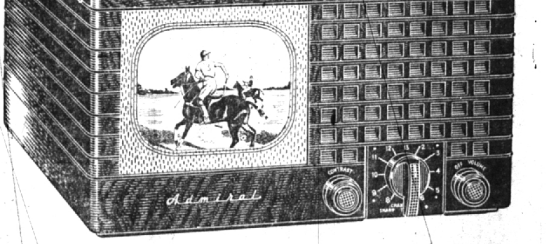
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
