housed in a basement room. Three wood-frame buildings, previously abandoned as unfit for use, are now filled to capacity.  
That there is little relief due in the future is brought out by the fact that there are 1,372 children in the district who are under five years of age, and who will be seeking admittance to public schools shortly. Another 552, of high school age, are having to be bused to other schools during their education, at great expense to the district and the state.  
The cost of the enlargement program has been estimated at \$900,000 for the high schools; \$280,000 for grade school additions and \$150,000 for equipment and other costs.

**Bond Issue Proposed**  
It is proposed to finance the program by a bond issue with a maximum interest rate of three and three quarter per cent with all bonds maturing in a period of 16 years. Although the proposed levy is sent out of the district to fund the program to finance the program is set up for a period of twenty years, the entire indebtedness could be paid off by July 1, 1960. If tax collections are good. As soon as the bonds are all paid, the tax levy will cease, the letter stated.  
If the proposition carries, taxpayers in the district would pay an increase of about \$9.90 per thousand on the assessed valuation in order that the high school and grade building additions may be built. Even with this increase the total school tax will be lower than that for practically every surrounding school district. Should the proposition fail, parents and school children in the district will be confronted with one of the most serious school situations in the entire metropolitan area," Schoen-shals said.

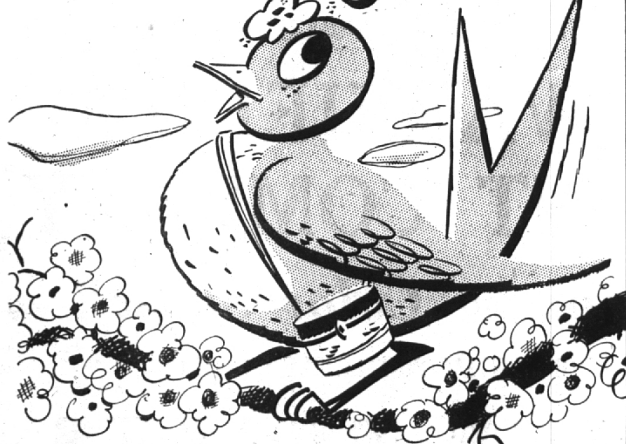

**BIRMINGHAM VETERANS**

Applications are now being accepted from senior dental students for intern training in the Navy. It was announced today by Lt. A. J. Schultz, Jr., USN in charge of Naval Officer Procurement in Detroit.  
The dental intern training is available to recent graduates in dentistry who will accept lieutenant (junior grade) commissions in the Dental Corps of the Regular Navy or Naval Reserve. The trainees agree to remain on active duty for a period of two years, the first of which will be dental intern training. The second year will be general duty assignment.

Ninety-eight per cent of the World War II veterans who have entered training under the G.I. Bill are eligible for additional training, according to figures disclosed by the Veterans Administration.  
At the end of January, 1949, a total of 6,228,707 veterans, a total of one time or another, had entered training under the G.I. Bill and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act. Of these, 5,749,023 had trained under the G.I. Bill and 479,684 had enrolled in schools and training establishments under the vocational rehabilitation act, or Public Law 16.  
Of this total, which represents 90 per cent of the nation's 15,081,000 World War II veterans, only 81,406 veteran students and trainees had exhausted their entitlement to further G.I. Bill training, while 81,899 disabled veterans had been declared rehabilitated under Public Law 16.  
Many veterans training under the G.I. Bill did not receive subsistence checks on time this month because they failed to notify Veterans Administration of a change in their address.  
All veterans receiving monthly checks from VA are urged to report promptly all address changes, since the Post Office Department cannot deliver a government check to addressees not occupied by the person to whom the check is issued.  
An undelivered check is returned to the Treasury Department disbursing office. This office notifies VA and the records are reviewed to determine whether the check actually was sent to the address furnished by the veteran. If the address used was the latest furnished, VA holds the check until it hears from the veteran.

**We Heard It Said By:**  
Ralph W. Moxley, chief of the Birmingham Police Department: "Just as soon as the warm weather comes, accidents increase.
