League of Women Voters Discuss State Legislation

Crowding the Clinic Room of the Community House to more than capacity, the League of Women Voters at their Monday morning meeting considered pending Fair Practices legislation and the 8 per cent Corporation Net Income Tax Bill. The group voted support of House Bill 148 and Senate Tax Bill 103.

"Support of the two bills in question will probably not mean much in the legislative arena, as both Bills 148 and 103 are currently reported "dead in committee." Hence the action of the Birmingham group does little more than affirm its adherence to the Michigan League of Women Voters three year stand on FEPC legislation," according to Mrs. Stanley A. Cain.

Feature Approved

The provision for education supporting the legislation of Bill 148 was a feature approved by participants in Monday's session, as well as the emphasis on friendly conciliation, backed up by enforcement where necessary.

Senate Tax Bill No. 103 was brought up for consideration under the state platform item: "Development of a co-ordinated state tax system through scientific research procedure, with increasing regard for the principle of ability to pay. Opposition to any regressive taxes."

The new president of the League, Mrs. Graham Shinnick,

introduced the morning's moderator, Mrs. William Williams. The discussion was opened by Mrs. William Williams, new legislative chairman of the League, who described the provisions of House Bill 148 and explained the history of the Michigan League of Women Voters' stand in support of the principle of FEPC. Mrs. John Ormond, a member of Governor William's advisory committee on Civil Rights, spoke in favor of House Bill 148, the Fair Practices Act, and Mrs. Raymond Giffels spoke in criticism of the bill.

In Favor of Bill

In the second discussion of the morning, Mrs. James Dunne, tax chairman of the Michigan League, spoke in favor of Senate Tax Bill 103, and Mrs. John Nagel of Bloomfield Hills spoke against it.

"The League's program on FEPC was complicated by a newly introduced Republican FEPC bill, as yet unnumbered and unprinted for citizen reading. The new bill, according to participants in the League discussion, does not provide for a full-time salaried commission nor does it have the authority of House Bill 148. This new bill, it is said, will be submitted to the voters for a final decision if adopted in Lansing," said Mrs. John Ormond.
