Instruction in the various types of fire making was given by Mrs. John P. St. Clair and with the fires blazing hotly, preparations for lunch were assigned to the different members of the group by means of a paper chart.

Cabin house-keeper Mrs. Robert Dudley will give you the information about them. Have you ever tried aluminum foil cookery for no-pot meals? Instead of carrying a pot for your supper, place your seasoned vegetables and bits of ground meat in aluminum foil. Add a little water to mix with the food juices for gravy. Seal all this in the foil, allowing for an air space. Place on hot coals or ashes. Sprinkle with hot ashes and then hot coals. In about 25-35 minutes, a succulent stew may be served.

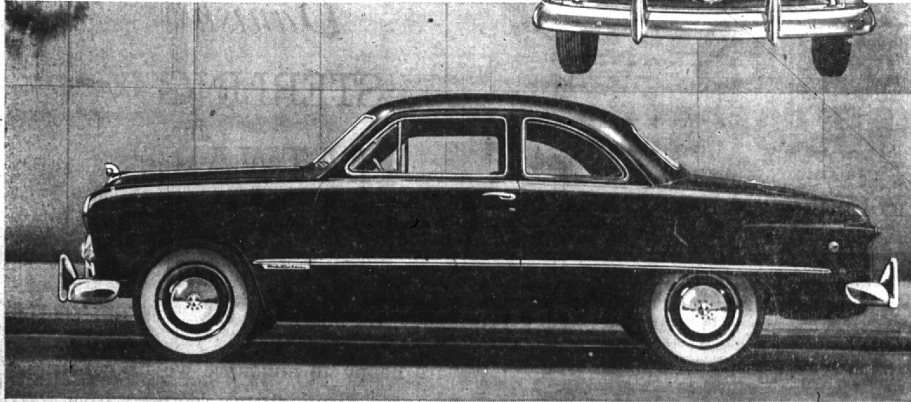
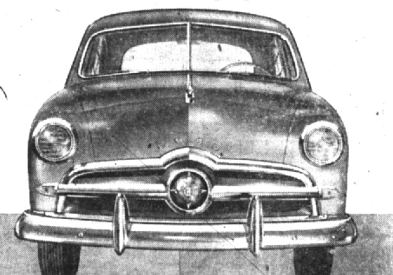
