Workers Donate Efforts
The clinic operates six days a week, with the leading doctors of Oakland county giving their time and skill in all divisions of medical science. During the past year the clinic treated 10,587 persons, an average of about 35 each day.

Wednesday and Fridays are set aside for the treatment of children. Their annual report showed that 573 children were provided with glasses in 1948.

Mrs. O'Connor stated that all doctors working with the clinic, as well as members of the auxiliary, donate their time.
