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Miss Dorothy Foster Will Speak to Youth Groups on May 1

Miss Dorothy Foster, teacher of English at Arkadelphia-Cotton Plant Academy, Cotton Plant, Ark., will speak to the combined youth groups of the First Presbyterian Church. Members of other Presbyterian youth groups have been invited and guilds of the Women's Association will also be present. The meeting will be at 7 p.m. on Sunday, May 1.

As the name of the site indicates (Cotton Plant Academy), this Presbyterian day and boarding school for young negroes is located in the cotton-growing "delta" section of Arkansas that spreads out for many miles along the Mississippi. Miss Foster's work as an English teacher means dealing with young people many of whom have had few educational privileges, coming as many of them do from share-cropper families living on large plantations.

Classroom teaching is only the beginning of her work. In the school and the village of Cotton plant she works with health classes, trains Sunday school teachers and leaders of women's organizations, acts as advisor to the young people's society, the Westminster Fellowship, and teaches in Sunday school. She is also active in the women's work in the church.

Carillon Recital
