ANN ARBOR—College alumni will have a chance to become students again at the University of Michigan for the week of June 13 to 18.

The Alumni University, which was started during the 1930's and then was discontinued because of the war, is being revived this year under the auspices of the University's Bureau of Alumni Relations and Extension Service.

Four lecture periods each day throughout the week, plus recommended reading, will be designed to bring Alumni University students up to date on contemporary American problems.

"While the Alumni University is designed primarily for University of Michigan graduates, the program will be open to the graduates of any college or university," Wilfred B. Shaw, director of alumni relations, announced.
