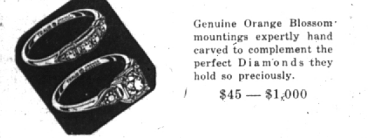

Public Invited to Girl Scout Fair, First of Its Kind in Birmingham

For a view of Birmingham's Girl Scouts in high gear, everyone is invited to the Community House on Saturday, April 9, when the Girl Scout Fair will be opened to the public. This display of Scouting is the first of its kind in Birmingham and replaces the annual Girl Scout Rally.

Miss Polly Hanson, general chairman of the Fair, announces that each of the 31 Brownie and Girl Scout troops in the Birmingham area will have a share in the afternoon's program. Over 100 invitations have been sent to local citizens interested in Girl Scouting, and in addition to parents and friends of the Scouts, the crowd attending will be increased by many Scout workers from adjoining communities such as Farmington, Pontiac, Royal Oak, Pleasant Ridge, Berkeley, Huntington Woods, Hazel Park, Waterford and Detroit.

The Fair will be opened at 3 p.m. by a formal flag ceremony by Troop 10 of Barnum school, the presentation of the new United Nations flag to the Birmingham Girl Scout Council will then be made. This flag was purchased by Troop 5 of Barium school and its staff, standard and spear is being presented by Troop 10. The flag will be available for loan by interested organizations.

Mrs. E. J. Barney, local chairman of the Juliette Low World Friendship Fund, will then receive each troop's annual contribution in cash, which represents their interest and concern in the international aspect of Girl Scouting. A life-long interest of Juliette Gordon Low, founder of Girl Scouting in the United States, was world friendship among girls, and the Juliette Low Fund is used to maintain international camps and
