Dr. Kemp Issues Pertinent Facts on Poliomyelitis

In response to many calls received at the city health office, Dr. W. Lloyd Kemp, Birmingham's health officer, this week issued a public statement setting forth general information to local residents regarding poliomyelitis.

Dr. Kemp said that to date three cases have been reported to health authorities here, with one fatality. He added that in keeping with the general trend in the state, the cases in Birmingham are appearing earlier than usual and in some higher incidence. Birmingham usually experiences the peak incidences during late August and September.

Parents were instructed to be wary of signs of a cold or stomach upset in a child where there are no signs in the community. "Such symptoms can be a warning of the start of the disease," he said. "The chances are good that a child having these symptoms does not have polio, however, because many illnesses of children start out that way. It is best, though, to not take unnecessary chances should these symptoms appear."

Common Symptoms

Dr. Kemp advised putting the victim of such symptoms to bed at once and keeping others, especially children, away. Medical advice should be obtained immediately. "The illness may not be the start of polio," the doctor said, "but if it is the medical and nursing care the patient receives from the very beginning may have a great bearing on how he comes through the illness."

"At the start, polio is often hard to distinguish from a severe cold, influenza or some of the diseases of childhood. Among the early symptoms are fever, headache, vomiting, fretfulness, drowsiness, at times a sore throat and a change in bowel habits. Stiffness and back pain may also be a polio warning."

Dr. Kemp said that to avoid polio means to avoid being crowded. Health should be kept in the best possible condition, with care taken to avoid being over-tired. He also advised against plunging into cold water at times when the body is overheated.

Avoid Crowds

"Avoid exposure of polio virus," he stated. "Although this is not entirely possible, many things can be done toward this end. During the polio season, persons with mild, undiagnosed forms of the disease can unknowingly spread it to others. As there is no practical way of knowing who these persons are, it is best to avoid mingling in crowds whenever possible. Children who have been exposed directly to a case of polio, and who are in any way suspected of having had contact with the disease, should be kept away from other children."

Dr. Kemp also advised that tonsil or adenoid operations should be postponed until after the polio season unless delay is a direct detriment to health.

Of the three cases in the city, William Bowman, 10, has been the only fatality.
