Speeders Pay Fines In Bloomfield Court; One Sentence Revised Traffic court in Bloomfield Hills has levied several fines during the past few days, mostly on reckless driving and speeding charges. Justice Alva Richardson fined James W. Hildebrandt, 24, of Detroit \$50 on a reckless driving charge arising from a collision last week Wednesday at the intersection of Woodward and West Lone Pine road. Mrs. Carrie L. Parker, 70, of Lone Pine court suffered minor injuries when her car was struck by Hildebrandt's

Lee Ellen, 25, also of Detroit, paid \$50 and surrendered his driver's license for a 30-day period, in lieu of spending 60 days in jail. He was charged with reckless driving and speeding at 85 miles an hour through Bloomfield Hills. Five other speeders paid fines totaling \$250 when they appeared in Richardson's court. The case of Tommy Williams, arrested July 28, was reviewed. Williams, arrested for driving while his operator's license was suspended, was sentenced to jail. When authorities learned that it would cost Williams his job to remain in jail for another 30 days, the review was granted.
