"Sorry, partner. Down one." The South was in the South seat gathering up the cards when he had over done his best—but fate was on the side of the opponents.

"Tsk! Tsk! Tsk! North and South gave you the contract. Why didn't you take it?"
"How do you mean?"
"By the trump shift at trick two."

"What good did that do me? I still had to find the club ace in East's hand. But West, the man so, had to hold it, of course."

"But you held the key card for a simple strip-and-throw-in play—the heart queen."
"Show me." And South spread the cards out on the table.

"Now," said North, "You must have known that West held the club ace. With only one bump from his partner, he carried the bidding up to four hearts before we took the contract at four spades."

"So he opened the heart king. If he had continued with the ace you would have been sunk. But he shifted to the spade ten at trick two. Now you had no trumps to worry about."

"All you had to do then was to cash your three diamond tricks and lead the heart queen. West would have been forced to grab it with his ace and would be in a hopeless position to lead. If he led a heart or a diamond you could ditch a club on one side and ruff on the other. If he led a club your king must make."

"Yes. You can duck up these trick plays during a post mortem. But I don't see you putting over so many of them during the actual play."
