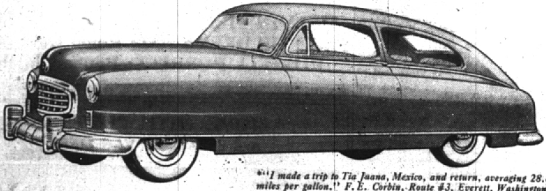
Kept Busy
