Tips on Touring

There's more to mountain driving than racing to the top and coasting down—and if you expect to cross a high range or two on your vacation trip, you'd do well to keep these pointers in mind:

1. Before starting up, be sure your oil and water are up to top level.
 2. Most modern mountain highways are engineered so you can take them in high gear, but be sure to shift into second the moment the engine begins to labor.
 3. Keep moving at a steady, slow pace to avoid overheating and to give you maximum control for any emergency.
 4. Stay strictly in your own lane—remember that uphill traffic should have undisputed right of way.
 5. Travel in second gear on the way down, but if you find yourself using brakes shift into low.
 6. Allow yourself time to stop and enjoy the view. It rests both you and your car.
 7. If you are squeamish about heights, keep your eyes on the center white line.
- Remember the warning sometimes posted along hilly highways: 'Drive Carefully—You May Meet a Fool.'

Vary the menu from day to day and breakfast will seem the important meal that it is. To help make these changes, there's a selection of meats just right for early morning menus.

The sausage family makes a big contribution to breakfast. Well-browned sausage patties or the little sausage links are luscious served with browned pineapple rings or combined with French toast and applesauce.

Like the patties and the individual links, it is placed in the frying-pan with water covered and cooked until the water evaporates. The cover of the pan is then removed and the sausage allowed to become nicely browned.

The fine smoked flavor of Canadian-style 'bacon' which is cured, boned, pork loin, makes it ideal for breakfast appetites. It is cooked exactly like cured ham slices, either broiled or pan-broiled.

Interesting breakfasts that can be easily planned around ground beef or lamb patties, hash with poached eggs, pan-broiled luncheon meat, ham or bacon omelet, broiled lamb or veal kidneys, broiled sweetbreads, liver and bacon or creamed leftover meat served on toast or baking powder biscuits.
