If you yourself have a "prise" tucked away in the hidden recesses of your kitchen or know anyone who does I'd like to hear from you.

Every year Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Silbar hike their two sons down to the State Fair no matter how inclement the elements. The youngsters are very businesslike in their inspection of the animals and fondly drive on the rickety rodeo. So while Pop and his buddies eat the dust roughed up by a bucking bronco or Brahma bull, Ruth makes a bee-line for the woman's building where handiwork and foodstuffs are her favorite matters for attention.

It was during one of these sessions that she spotted some enticing, tongue-teasing cookies. Noting the name and address of the woman who had made them, she later sent off a note asking for the recipe. What consisted of a reply was a composite of English and German, all garbled with colloquialisms and foreign phraseology.

Wager to send the recipe, the woman related how she'd brought them over to this country from her home in Bavaria. After deciphering and translating the reply, Ruth headed for the kitchen and concocted a batch of nine Alibicon cookies. Here's how they're made, word for word according to the original measurements.

- 9 ounces sugar
 - 2 eggs
 - 9 ounces flour
 - 1 tablespoon anise seed.
- Stir eggs and sugar until very creamy and lemon colored. Add the flour and anise seed. Place on greased baking sheet and bake until light colored, 10-15 minutes in moderate oven.
- Vanilla Kipfel
 - 5 ounces butter
 - 7 ounces flour
 - 2 ounces sugar
 - 3 ounces blanched ground almonds (or pecan nut)
- Mix everything on board until very smooth. Make a long roll like

1/2 cup soft butter
1/4 cup soft shortening
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 cups of flour
2 egg yolks

Creasy batter and shortening until very fluffy and add sugar and yolks and stir until lemon colored. Add salt and flour. Let dough rest for 1/2 hour then form little balls and place on greased baking sheet. Press little finger dipped in flour on top of each cookie and fill with raspberry jelly. Then brush well with beaten egg white and bake 15-20 minutes at 350 degrees.
