**Traffic Deaths In State Show Further Drop**  
June was the third consecutive month in which there has been a downward trend in traffic deaths in Michigan, according to the monthly statistical report of the State Police.

Fatalities numbered 87, a reduction of 31, or 26 per cent, under the 118 killed in the same month a year ago. There were 3,382 persons injured, a reduction of 191, or five per cent, but total reported accidents increased to 11,165, a gain of 245, or two per cent.

During April and May, most of the net fatality reduction was on rural trunkline highways, but there was also a substantial decrease in urban areas.

**586 Killed This Year**  
During the first six months of this year there have been 586 persons killed, 18,034 injured and 6,760 accidents reported. Compared with the same period last year, there were 11 fewer deaths, two per cent, injuries increased 23, or one per cent, and reported accidents were down 2,183, or three per cent.

Bicycle and run-off-roadway deaths increased, while there was a reduction in pedestrian fatalities and those caused by collisions. Mileage for the month of May, the last month for which figures are now available, showed a gain of six per cent over the same month a year ago. Mileage for the first five months showed a four per cent increase as compared with the same period in 1948 and the death rate per hundred million miles of travel was down one per cent.
