at State-Wide U N Conference**

On Pearl Harbor Day, Dec. 7, United Nations Conference will be open to the public, will be held in the Auditorium Building of Michigan State College in East Lansing, the first state-wide U N meeting of its kind to be held in Michigan.

Speakers at the conference will include, in addition to Mrs. Cain, Dr. William Agar, chief of the section for lectures and educational services, the United Nations; President Hannah of Michigan State College; Dr. Milton Mueller, formerly deputy head of the United States program of education for occupied Germany, and now head of the department of political science, Michigan State College; Miss Mabel Head, official U N observer for the United States program of education for occupied Germany, and J. Donald Phillips, head of the adult education department of Michigan State College, famed for his work in the field of distance education.
