**Little Symphony Tickets are Still Available to Public**

There is still time to purchase tickets from Mrs. Herbert E. Gardner or Mrs. Albert deSalle for the Detroit Little Symphony concert being presented tomorrow evening, Dec. 2, in the Royal Oak high school auditorium.

Seward Ross, chairman for the Little Symphony, states "We did not organize our orchestra as a stopgap or substitute for the Detroit Symphony. When we began playing together last January, we had not planned to perform publicly—the outlook for the Detroit Symphony was still bright. Otherwise, we might never have had the courage to start."

Rosen continues with "Little symphonies (sometimes called chamber orchestras or symphonyettes) and big symphonies have complementary musical functions. They exist side by side in Boston, New York, Cleveland, Minneapolis, St. Louis and Los Angeles—and some day soon, will coexist in Detroit. "The standard large symphony of 90 or 100 members is a comparatively modern development. It came into use in the 1850's when the first big halls seating audiences upwards of a thousand, were built. The early works of Beethoven, and nearly all the compositions of his predecessors, were arranged for a more intimate setting, for orchestras of less than 40 musicians. "In every succeeding era some of the finest orchestral works continued to be written for just such a medium."
