City Opposes State Use of Liquor Fees, Intangible Taxes

Birmingham city commissioners Monday night went on record as opposing the two bills, recently introduced into the state legislature, which would take away liquor license fees and the intangibles tax from cities and return them to the state treasury.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert said that already the state has taken \$25,000 from the city in liquor tax revenue, while the two new measures, if approved, would mean the loss of an additional \$19,000.

"This would offset any monies Birmingham presently receives from the sales tax diversion," the manager stated. "This revenue should be retained for local governments, and diverting these taxes to the state is not a proper solution to the state's financial problems."
