Oakland County RED CROSS NEWS

"The Red Cross in the Community" was the subject of a panel discussion held Wednesday evening in the Birmingham Community House. The occasion was the regular monthly dinner meeting of the Community Service Council.

Speaking during the program were Mrs. E. J. Phillips, leading state public relations officer of the American Red Cross.

Speakers included Mrs. Mildred Bennett, executive secretary of the Oakland County Red Cross; Mrs. Ferd M. Brock, chairman of the volunteer services; Mrs. F. C. Stuart of Ferndale, chairman of the field consultant of the Middle West area; Mrs. Layton Northrup, chairman of the education committee, and Mrs. T. W. Eustis, chairman of the home service committee.

Two short movies, "Disaster" and "Water Safety" were shown following brief talks by the chairmen. Exhibits of all services had been arranged and were visited by members of the Community Service Council following the panel discussion.

New duties of the Gray Ladies and Nurses' Aides were explained by Mrs. Brock. As part of an entirely new venture, she said, "Nurses' Aides now are working with visiting nurses, thereby releasing the nurses from certain routine bedside care and enabling them to devote more time to phases of nursing which the Aides are unable to handle. Under the new plan the work of Gray Ladies has also been enlarged. They will assist in clinics in certain cases, and may be called upon for a variety of duties."

Mrs. Brock cited a recent instance in which a Gray Lady took over care of children in a home in order that the wife of a veteran confined in the Percy Jones Hospital could visit the hospital at the request of the attending doctor.

Work of the Junior Red Cross was outlined by Miss Cook. Other speakers explained operation of their own departments.

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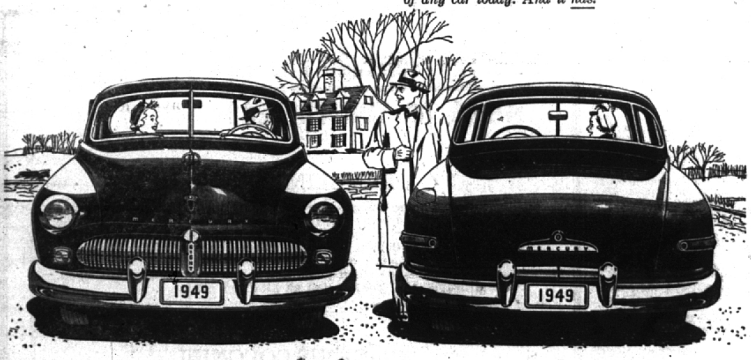
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
