Square dancing, which evolved from country folk dances brought over from Europe in colonial days, is meeting a distinct revival throughout the country. Evidence of popularity of square dancing in Birmingham is the fact that 127 couples attended the January square dance at Adams school. Dances at the school are under direction of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Brennan, who have been "calling" for the school dances for the past several years. Adams school square dances are technically part of an adult education program. The dances are held monthly under the general chairmanship of Mr. and Mrs. Robert G. Silbar. The March square dance will be held on March 19 and the last dance of the season will be held April 29, it has been announced.

Girl Scout Board Adopts Budget Mrs. Cassius Miller, newly elected president of Birmingham Girl Scout Council, presented at the monthly meeting of the board of directors held at the Community House, Friday, Feb. 11. At this time the annual budget was presented and approved. Mrs. Raymond Bower, finance chairman, received the approval and adoption by the board for the budget of \$15,721.50 presented by her to cover the year's activities of Girl Scouts in Birmingham. For the maintenance of the Girl Scout cabin at Springdale Park an item of \$313 is included in the budget covering utility services, plumbing and repairs, insurance and new equipment. Another item, relatively small in itself, but large in the experience it provides Girl Scouts, is \$70 for the operation of the annual two week Day Camp held at the cabin, each summer and open to all Brownies and Scouts. Another item in the budget is \$485 for training of all adult workers associated with Scouting in the community. In this item is provision for conferences and training courses, audio-visual aids, fellowship meetings for leaders and a leaders library.
