**Judge Richardson Orders Psychiatric Treatment for Man**

Judge Alva J. Richardson of Bloomfield Hills, Monday sentenced William W. Rominske, 34, of Detroit to pay a fine of \$100 and spend 90 days in jail on a disorderly conduct charge.

Rominske was arrested after diving himself up on a felonious assault charge last Tuesday when he learned he was wanted for questioning by the Bloomfield Hills police. He was sought after messengers in the car driven by James H. Cullen, 18, of Highland Park turned his license number over to the police, alleging that Rominske had driven close to their car and, pointing a gun at them, ordered them to the side of the road. They reported the man suddenly sped away, before they had stopped.

Rominske's background was carefully checked by the police, who said he was apparently well thought of by neighbors and employers. After consultation with his attorney, he declined to see a lie detector test Monday, which had been ordered after he denied having any part in the highway episode, and entered a plea of guilty to the disorderly conduct charge.

Richardson suspended the jail sentence, placing the man in care of a psychiatrist, who will make monthly reports on his behavior and condition. Lt. Ima Hanks, of the Bloomfield Hills police, said Rominske claimed he had no idea why he acted as he did. The gun was confiscated by police.

**City Accepts Bid on Sewer, Bridge Bonds**

The low bid of the 1st of Michigan Corp. and Jones B. Shannon & Co., of Detroit on \$50,000 in general obligation bridge bonds and \$100,000 in general obligation sewer bonds was accepted by the city commission Monday evening.

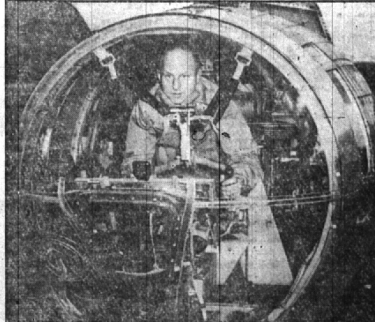
The successful bidder quoted \$30,000 of the bonds due 1950-1955 at 2 1/2 per cent, with the remainder from 1956-1969 at 2 per cent. Net interest to maturity will amount to \$40,613, City Treasurer Russell T. Berger determined.

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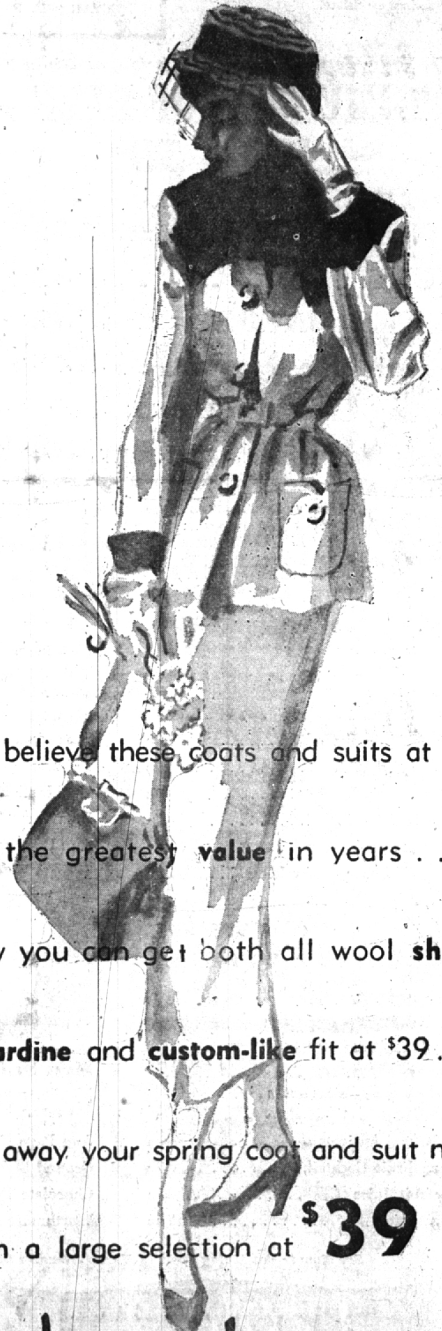
