Birmingham took firsts and seconds in every event with Jack Adams, Dick Dean, Don Goldsmith, Bob Webster, Dick Helgeson, and Ted Harper leading their respective races.

Set New Records
 New school and pool records were set by Dick Dean in the 100 yard breaststroke; Bob Webster in the 100 yard free style; and Ted Harper, 150 yard individual medley. Both Dean and Harper have broken records in the last three meets.

Since Port Huron didn't enter any divers, a scored diving exhibition was given by Maples Chuck Marshall, Lee Hanson, Frank Weaver, and Tom Daniels. Hanson led with 24 points; Marshall was second with 23, and Weaver and Daniels tied for third with 21.

This was Birmingham's first swimming meet with Port Huron, coached by John Deering.
