Mrs. Lambert is the former Lena Bemole, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Fred Bemole who resided on a farm on West 11 Mile road, now known as Huntington Woods. Her husband is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Philip Lambert who also lived on the farm their present home, at Woodward and 14 Mile road.

Many out of town guests were present including a sister of Mrs. Lambert from Mt. Clemens and a sister of Mr. Lambert from Highland Park. A long distance telephone call came from Mrs. Anna Zorn in Colorado Springs, Mrs. Zorn, formerly of Royal Oak

Over A Plank Road

During the festivities, the guests reminisced about Mr. and Mrs. Lambert's early days in Birmingham. Mr. Lambert has lived on the same premises for 68 years, having originally come from Detroit's Milwaukee avenue. He once hauled hay by horse and wagon from Birmingham to the Detroit car barns as the street cars in those days were horse-drawn.

Mrs. S. A. Cain Finds UN Conferences Heartening Rather Than Disillusioning

Mrs. Stanley A. Cain, just returned from a week of conferences and sessions at the United Nations, addressed a League of Women Voters UN regional planning conference Tuesday afternoon at Baldwin Library. Delegates from Birmingham, Royal Oak and Detroit were present to discuss plans for the UN spring community campaigns now being launched all over the country. Mrs. Cain is both a Birmingham and state UN chairman of the League.

"The strengthening of the United Nations depends on an informed and determined electorate, particularly in the United States," Mrs. Cain declared. "Our leadership and power have thrust the responsibility in our own laps. I think we are too prone to feel that the responsibility at this point is entirely Russia's, that since she has been the major stumbling block, by the same token, there is nothing more for us to do except to sit back and wait for Russia's conversion or exit from the stage."

Mrs. Cain found a first hand view of the United Nations heartening rather than disillusioning. "We should all write to the editors of our newspapers and ask to hear more details of the accomplishments of the UN," she suggested. "The headlines feed our fears whereas actually, particularly in social and economic fields, the UN has records of growing cooperation and positive action."

Besides attending sessions of the Security Council and Trusteeship Council, Mrs. Cain had conferences with Phillip Jessup, Warren Austin and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, first-ranking UN delegate to the UN and sessions with state UN chairmen of the League.

The nature of her visit, she explained, as she was one of 55 delegates to the UN conference called by the national board of the League of Women Voters.

The number one item of the League's national agenda is the strengthening of the UN. Mrs. Cain explained, and the League have been working since September on the question. The conference at Lake Success was called to get the stage for the community campaigns and to work on technical details of the UN. She understood their stake in the United Nations.

Will Take Part In Panel Discussion Of Security Facts

First Hand View

Mrs. Frederick G. Garrison and Russell Barnes, both of Birmingham, along with Royce Holmes of Detroit and John Marshall of Windsor, will participate in a panel discussion on "Collective Security Facts: A Course of Action for the U. S.," Feb. 11.

Mrs. Garrison is an enthusiastic traveler and has lived in Spain, Argentina and Chile. She returned last year from an extensive trip which took her into many sections of that vast American ally.

She is also a member of the board and chairman of the Inter-American Affairs Committee of the Detroit Foreign Policy Association.

Is A. Specialist in international politics.

Barnes is rated as a specialist on political news, and is one of the leading news commentators in the state. He has been with the Detroit News since before his graduation from the University of Michigan in 1920. During the war he served as foreign correspondent, and for six years followed him from country to country.

He was in England during the blitz of 1941, and later served as Director of Psychological Warfare in the Mediterranean Theatre. He commanded some 4,000 French, Italian and British, both civil and military personnel in this phase of the war.

Marshall is associate editor of the Windsor Star and has stressed political reporting in his work. During the war he covered many important conferences, including that of Roosevelt and Churchill at Quebec.

Holmes is a well known editorial executive and military analyst and has been with the Free Press since 1927. He served as a lieutenant colonel during the war, and was chief of the army news service in the United States.
